SPONSORSHIP "GOTS TO KNOWS"

(Please clip and save these Sponsorship guidelines for easy reference!)

Our Spring Walks are quickly approaching and nearly all the spots are all filled with Pilgrims who are answering God's call. However, it is not too early to begin thinking, and to be in prayerful consideration of whom you will sponsor in the Fall. You have been, or will be starting, to talk over your sponsorship ideas with God and may have already made some contacts with your pilgrim. Remember, that the Walk to Emmaus has very specific guidelines or "Gots to Know's" that we must keep in mind.

Failure to heed the Walk to Emmaus' ideas on sponsorship can result in a diminished experience for not just the pilgrim you have sponsored, but many others—other pilgrims, team members, and even you, the sponsor.

Below are some "Gots to Knows":

- Start with prayer. Pray that God will show you the person who is ready, willing, and in need of the Emmaus experience.
- Present the Walk to your would-be pilgrim. Take the attitude that you are giving the person a wonderful gift rather than he/she "needs to go."
- · Wait for his/her decision.
- Work actively to support the pilgrim, before, during and after the Walk.
- Do not take sponsorship responsibilities lightly or carry them out casually or haphazardly.
- Pray extensively, with diligent thought, careful planning and follow through.

The *Walk to Emmaus Sponsorship* booklet details wise and unwise sponsorship. Below is an excerpt from the sponsorship manual (pages 12-15).

Whom to Sponsor

Sponsorship can be unwise or wise. Unwise sponsorship results from unbridled enthusiasm that wants everyone to have the same experience. Sponsors with unbridled enthusiasm approach anybody and everybody with the admonition that "you need to go on The Walk," and that open invitation is the primary (sometimes the only) emphasis. This approach lacks discernment and will result in a burden for the church.

Wise sponsorship is careful, intentional, prayerful, and purposeful because it results from God's leading. Pilgrims return to their churches and communities renewed in their commitments to be effective disciples.

Unwise Sponsorship

The sponsor has two considerations to make: Whom to sponsor and whom not to sponsor. A key factor in your consideration is the comfort level of the pilgrim. Those persons who would find The Walk to Emmaus a discomforting experience should not be pressed to attend. This discomfort might extend to the beliefs about God, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit that differ from the traditional Christian belief of the Holy Trinity. The Walk to Emmaus is designed to foster Christian community; it is not a place of theological or religious debate. Persons who challenge

the basic tenets of the Christian faith may become disruptive agents or may become silent and withdrawn. Remember, Emmaus is not for everyone. Some Christian groups have specific dietary restrictions and Sabbath celebrations that the Emmaus weekend experience cannot provide. Because we respect their traditions we do not sponsor persons from such groups. Do not sponsor persons who are not members of a church. These people are not in the position to benefit from Emmaus and then return to their church for additional leadership responsibilities.

Many fine Christian leaders or members of local churches may not be good prospects for Emmaus at a particular time. Put the names of people involved in emotional distress on a list and contact them after the resolution of their emotional situation. Such emotional situations include death of a loved one, divorce proceedings, and work downsizing operations. Defer persons with protracted health problems until their health has improved. Consider those facing surgery and those recovering from surgery at a later time. Carefully consider people whose health conditions don't allow them to sit in the conference room chairs for several hours at a time. These stressful situations may absorb these persons completely, and they will have a difficult time concentrating on Jesus Christ and their relationship with Him for seventy-two hours.

Other persons to avoid sponsoring on The Walk to Emmaus are church-hoppers and soapboxers. The church-hopper joins the church, finds something wrong, complains, then leaves. This person is looking for the perfect church. Church-hoppers can't produce good fruit because they are never satisfied. Like the seed in the parable of the sower (Matt. 13:20-21), they are sown on rocky soil. The seed grows but does not have a strong root; it wavers and falls, never producing fruit.

Have you ever planned an enjoyable evening with friends only to have it spoiled by a soapboxer? One person feels the need to talk extensively about a pet subject that interests no one else. That person is a soapboxer. Soapboxers use any forum to talk about their favorite theme and to dominate the situation. They do not hear or want to hear other views, and they frequently chide people who do not agree with them. The writers of Ephesians (5:6) and Colossians (2:8) describe these persons who come with fancy words and their own philosophy, trying to sway us to their position.

Church-hoppers and soapboxers will distract those who want to enhance their spiritual growth during the weekend experience. Out of consideration for the others on the weekend as well as for the Emmaus community and the growth of the local church, do not sponsor church-hoppers and soapboxers.

Persons who differ doctrinally from the basic doctrine espoused in The Walk to Emmaus do not make strong prospects for the Walk. Controversy over doctrine causes divisiveness, and The Walk to Emmaus is designed to bring the body of Christ together.

Wise Sponsorship

Whom, then, do you sponsor? Initially consider sponsoring persons who are committed to living a life that is pleasing to God, those who want to grow and increase their knowledge and understanding of God and God's will. These persons evidence an excitement about being a Christian and recognize God's work in the lives (Cont'd on Page 4)

(Sponsorship—Cont'd from Page 3) of those around them. Sponsor church leaders—anyone actively involved in the church—including those in visible leadership roles. This broad-based understanding of leadership encompasses persons who help in the nursery and those who teach church school or assist a church school teacher. Persons serving on committees, singing in the choir, helping with drama, participating in the men's or women's groups, or helping with any outreach program in the church are all in positions of leadership. Anyone who actively participates in the ministry of the local church is in a position of leadership.

Among these leaders of the church, seek those who are *authenticators*. Authenticators give prayerful, careful, and fair consideration of ideas; listen more than they speak (James 1:19); and are well respected among the membership. When given a job to do, these persons accept the job and follow through to its completion. You can count on them. They pursue God's calling. If authenticators are the first church members to attend the Emmaus weekend and have a positive experience, they will make it much easier to sponsor others in that church.

After sponsoring the authenticators in a church, then turn your attention to those who actively work in the church behind the scenes, fulfilling the role of the servant (Mark 10:43-45). Servants put discipleship into action. They prepare communion; they serve as ushers, work in the kitchen and nursery, and assume the responsibility for having the proper adornments on the chancel furniture. They regularly inspect the choir and acolyte robes and have them repaired when needed. They manage the church library and regularly inspect all church bulletin boards to remove outdated and unnecessary material. They frequently assist with, or totally provide, custodial care and gardening services. Their involvement includes care giving programs, secretarial support, and visitation of shut-ins and visitors. Often these people are the backbone of the church. They willingly do whatever is asked of them; they are the first ones to see a need and make an effort to fulfill it. Frequently they receive little recognition for their efforts and prefer it that way. Their joy comes from serving God in the little ways.

Then move on to those persons in the church who are seeking their service role—faithful attendees, dependable persons with many talents and gifts who seem to be searching for a place to serve. Many times these people are just waiting to be asked to do something. When they find an area that matches their gifts, they usually become strong leadership potential.

Sponsors should commit to recruiting strong church leaders in order to strengthen the local church. For The Walk to Emmaus to be effective, individual congregations must know how to use the program. Emmaus is not a place where a local church sends its problem members to get "straightened out," nor is it an evangelistic tool to "make new Christians." Emmaus is meant to strengthen church leaders... the Walk to Emmaus cannot do everything; instead it has narrowed its focus to the spiritual renewal of church leaders. Our sole purpose in recruiting new Pilgrims should be the strengthening of our own congregations. (Day Four, 50)

Viewing The Walk to Emmaus as a hospital to cure all ills will weaken the community. Pray and work to strengthen the community and renew the church. Remember that The Walk to Emmaus is not for everyone. Be certain that the individual you invite is right for Emmaus and that Emmaus is right for that individual.

Hello! My name is Donna Tavis and I am the new agape coordinator. Do you remember all the wonderful agape you received on your walk?

Now you have the opportunity to help shower God's love on the pilgrims for Walk #10 by contributing your own agape. Creating table and bedtime agape is a wonderful project for share groups, couples, classes or individuals. You don't have to be "crafty", just creative. After reading the Upper Room's Handbook of Emmaus, which we have a covenant agreement to adhere to, I discovered a couple of areas where the Love Community has strayed from the model set forth in this handbook concerning agape.

The first concerns table and bedtime agape. Since agape is an expression of unconditional love, no personal names can be attached, although share group and church names are acceptable.

For example, you could use Rose of Sharing Sisters, or Sunshine UMC, but you should not use Donna, Vickie, Lori and Judy, etc. The pieces of agape do not have to recognize the donors at all. If you have already prepared agape for the upcoming walks and have your name(s) on them and cannot easily remove them, that's okay. Bring it anyway. Just remember this rule when preparing agape for future walks.

For each walk we need approximately 60 pieces of agape (or 30 pieces of each for pilgrims only). Please place agape in a bag or box with a label or note attached with your name and the number of pieces enclosed. Any leftovers may be picked up after each walk and used to jump start your agape for the next walk.

The second area involves the personal agape letters. The Emmaus Handbook limits the number of letters a pilgrim is to receive during the walk to 12. The pilgrims may receive an unlimited number of letters, but it will be up to the sponsor to hold out the letters from 12 family and friends closest to the pilgrim. All other agape letters will be given to the sponsor to give to the pilgrim after the closing on Sunday (perhaps in the car on the way home). There are a few advantages to this limit. With the time allotted, the pilgrims will be able to read the 12 letters and not feel rushed. It also eliminates any feeling of being "less loved" if one pilgrim receives a few letters and another pilgrim receives an abundance.

The Men's Walk is May 5—8 and the Women's Walk is June 2—5, so let's get those creative juices flowing!

This article was written by Dick Gilmore, International Lay Director, Walk to Emmaus:

There has been a lot of discussion surrounding the topic of the separation of the "behind the scenes" support group and the conference room team. Many people struggle with understanding the reason why the Walk to Emmaus program has always intended for this separation to occur. It is simply about teaching us how to serve anonymously without wanting credit for what we do. The cloistered environment of the pilgrims and the conference room team has a history that spans about 60 years.

The anonymity of servants in support of the conference room group is based on several premises. The first is found in the Scriptures. Matthew, chapter 6 provides extensive examples of Christ admonishing us to do things in such a manner that attention is not drawn to the individual, but that the service is rendered solely for the sake of Christ—anonymous servanthood. Another example in Scripture is Matthew 25 where Christ speaks of separating the sheep and the goats. The one group was so engrossed in providing service, they were unaware they were providing the service. This is a demonstration of anonymous servanthood.

The second premise is that excessive requirements for people to be involved in Emmaus functions detract from our primary responsibility to serve our church and our family. Conference room team meetings do not provide any help or guidance for support servants to fulfill their responsibilities during the Emmaus event.

The third premise is that the Conference Room Team needs to develop into Christian community so they can live and demonstrate Christian community to the pilgrims. It is difficult for this to be accomplished in the 23-26 hours of team meetings. Adding others to the team meetings will require a longer period of time to develop Christian community, and if there are too many additions, it will actually prevent the group from forming Christian community.

The fourth premise is that the weekend is for the pilgrims. Everything that happens is for the pilgrims, not the team and not the support persons. The talks are prepared **for the pilgrims** and the personal examples cited in the talks are **for the pilgrims**.

The fifth premise is that the cloistered conference room group becomes the example for the reunion group. What is said there - stays there. What happens in that group—stays in that group.

The sixth premise is that the cloistered environment affirms the pilgrims that they can open up in confidence. The group they are with in the conference room is the same for the entire 72-hour experience.

The seventh premise is the concept that there is a definite difference between true service and self-service. This is eloquently presented in the chapter on service in Richard Foster's book titled Celebration of Discipline.

The eighth premise is that we each need to experience anonymous servanthood as part of our leadership development. The purpose of Emmaus is to develop leaders for the church. If we can't serve anonymously in the area of true service, there is no way we can be an effective servant leader in front of people.

The ninth premise is based on the awe of the pilgrims as they experience all that is happening, but do not see anyone providing all the things—things just happen and things just appear.

The tenth premise is the revelation at closing when the pilgrims see for the first time the large number of people who have been working *behind the scenes* in support of them.

Taking these ten premises together, they provide the foundation for and a profound demonstration of what Christianity is all about. It all flows together as a dynamic example of Christian love or agape love. This is the one principle that sets Christianity apart from all other religions.

There is a critical element to having the support team working behind the scenes. The support group serves as a hedge of protection around the cloistered conference room group. This hedge of protection is there to keep out other influences, interruptions, diversions, etc., so the pilgrims are able to devote their entire being—heart, mind, spirit - to their encounter with Jesus Christ, and be receptive to the workings of the Holy Spirit in each of them.

Your expressions of concern have been voiced by others, but this has been a very small minority of Emmaus people. There are other communities where the issue has been raised, yet they agreed to abide by the covenant and conduct the Walk events according to The Upper Room Model. The responses from these communities have been of the following: "How freeing it is to follow the model."

Please prayerfully consider all the above. Review the Scriptures and carefully read Richard Foster's book.


