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Change a Life - Sponsor Someone!

Sometimes we wish that we could find some simple thing to do that would make a great deal of difference in someone's life. Being called to do God's work can seem to be an overwhelming task at times. As we all know, the good news is that God helps us with this, and I believe one of the helps that He has given us is this little thing called the Emmaus Walk. One of the best and most simple things you can do to make a vast difference in someone's life is to be a sponsor for them and welcome them into the strong and faithful Emmaus Community.

Don't make any assumptions—you may be surprised who would be absolutely delighted to go. There are people out there just waiting for a little nudge to make the decision. When I was first asked to go on my walk, I don't think I had even heard of Emmaus. I was at a point in life where I wasn't even sure if I was worthy. All it took was a bit of gentle persuasion from a fellow church member, who I didn't even really know at the time, but since have come to know very well—which, by the way, is another one of those things I mentioned that have made a difference in my life since my Walk. I just can't put into words how much difference that one slight gentle persuasion by someone I hardly knew has developed into such radical changes in me and in my walk with God. I am thoroughly convinced that had I not been a part of such a wonderful community in Emmaus and supported by a great group of friends I have met within the community, I would have drifted far from the path I should be following.

Don't be discouraged if someone you approach does not accept your invitation. Even if the person you have asked does not decide to go this time, at least you have planted the seed and you have let them know that someone takes interest in their spirituality, which can be a very powerful thing... you have been a part of opening the door for greater things in that person's spiritual journey. The seed you planted will grow when the time is right; whether that time is immediate or several years later. You may never know the effect you have on someone simply by showing this interest and being an ambassador of God in that person's life.

Think about the opportunities that your sponsor has opened up for you. Aren't you glad your sponsor stepped out of their comfort zone and approached you? Aren't you glad your sponsor didn't think you were "not the type"? Aren't you glad your sponsor didn't decide it would be "too much trouble"? Do what your sponsor has done for you for someone else. Take it from me, they will hold a dear spot in their heart for you, and you will be doing one of the greatest things I know of to help them grow in their Spiritual journey... and what a wonderful journey it is!

As I sat down at the computer to submit an article for

our newsletter, I pondered on what I would say. I know the definition of "volunteering", but decided to see what I could find when I did a search on the word, "volunteer". Here is just a few of the things I found on "volunteering".

First the definition – the word **volunteer** is a verb which means to offer oneself as a volunteer, to offer or bestow.

Since my students love to use Wikipedia, I went to their site to see what they had to say about the word.

Wikapedia says:

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A **volunteer** is someone who serves in a community primarily because they choose to do so. Many serve through a non-profit organization – sometimes referred to as formal volunteering, but a significant number also serve less formally, either individually or as part of a group. By definition, a volunteer worker does not get paid or receive compensation for services rendered.

They also give motivation and reward reasons on the site:

Motivations and Rewards

Each person's motivations will be unique — but will often be a combination of the following:

- Altruism volunteering for the benefit of others. Most people argue that there are no purely altruistic volunteers altruism is a common motivation but never the only motivation for sustained commitment to serve there is always some aspect of personal gain or satisfaction
- Quality of Life serving community because doing service makes ones own life better — is perhaps the most significant motivation for volunteering. It is often mixed with a good dose of altruism. Included here would be the benefits people get from being with other people, staying active, and above all having a sense of the value of ourselves in society that may not be as clear in other areas of life.
- **Giving Back** many people have in some way benefited from the work of an organization, or more generally, and volunteer to give back.
- **Religious Conviction** Many faiths hold that service to others or the community is a spiritual duty or a means of reaching higher spiritual states.
- Social Reasons Volunteering is a good way to meet a lot of different people from other walks of life and it is often easy to make new friends.

I find the motivation and reward to be God's servant, his hands and feet. I looked up scriptures about serving. There are several. One of my favorite is in **Deuteronomy 10:12 Serve** the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul.

Another verse, **1 Corinthians 12:4-6** 4 There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. 5 There are different kinds of **service**, but the same Lord. 6 There are different kinds of working, but the same God works all of them in all men.

Get involved with the upcoming Walks. There are several ways to do this:

- 1. Bring a friend or a share group and volunteer to clean Ruggles for the Walks.
- 2. Make agape for the Walks.
- 3. Sponsorship if God lays a name on your heart then pray for that person and approach them about attending a Walk.
- 4. Cook a meal or serve a meal.
- 5. Clean up after a Walk.
- 6. Serving on a team.

These are just to name a few. Pray and ask God how He wants you to become a "volunteer" to do his work.

There are a lot of you out there that were once very active in our LOVE Community that aren't anymore. We just want you to know that you are sorely missed. We can only pray that it is just the Community you have forsaken and not our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

I guess I just need to second Tim Naylor's motion, "If you don't do anything else today, just forgive." That is the key to walking with Christ. And, oh my, how much He and we want you to be walking together with us.

From the Community Lay Director

Committing to *THE WALK TO EMMAUS* Ministry as The LOVE Community

Each year the local governing body of the Walk to Emmaus movement is asked to review and renew its letter of agreement with the Upper Room International Emmaus Office. This was done at the January Gathering. By signing the Letter of Agreement, the group is agreeing to conduct the Emmaus program in a manner that is faithful to the following statements:

•The local governing body will be organized and will conduct its business in accordance with the Emmaus Office guidelines in a manner that honors Christ and His church.

•The local governing body will carry out the three-phase method of Emmaus in accordance with the most recent edition of *The Upper Room Handbook on Emmaus* and the most recent edition of The Upper Room manuals. The three-phase method includes:

- Pre-event phase a plan for sound recruitment, communication about, and proper preparation of participants and team for their three-day experience;
- Event phase separate three-day events for men and women, using the Emmaus Office outlines for the 10 lay and 5 clergy talks; and
- Post-event phase a follow-up plan that includes group reunions, monthly gatherings, and leadership training for increasing the effectiveness of providing spiritual renewal for local church involvement.
- The Emmaus program invites interdenominational, interracial and international participation, and fosters a spirit of Christian acceptance and unity.

There are 15 statements in all, committing to the Walk to Emmaus program. The Emmaus Office seeks to continually improve the Emmaus ministry. May we of The LOVE Community become increasingly faithful in carrying out our Lord's Work through this ministry.

"The Emmaus group reunion is a small accountability group of two to six persons who have usually participated in the three-day Walk to Emmaus and who want to continue their personal pursuit of a life lived wholly in the grace of God.

These small follow-up groups help pilgrims translate the message conveyed on the Walk to Emmaus weekend into a daily walk with Christ. With the regular support of a few faithful friends, the gift of God's love in Jesus Christ becomes a lifestyle of Christian discipleship through the threefold discipline of piety, study, and action.

Group reunions have a common purpose: to help us persevere in grace. Group reunions undergird our desire to carry those aspects of the three-day experience that we most value and that are fundamental to our formation as faithful Christian disciples into our everyday lives."

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him.

You can find an application on the website or you can let me know and I can send you one. The pilgrim must fill out


